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






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#### 245 East Main St. - COURTHOUSE

Kalida was designated as the first County Seat in 1829. In 1835 the Kalida Courthouse was constructed of logs, later replaced by one of brick. In December, of 1864 the building was destroyed by a disastrous fire in which many valuable records were lost. Great controversy raged over the proposal to move the county seat to Ottawa where railroads were being built. In 1865, the Legislature of State authorized an election. A majority of votes for Ottawa resulted in the removal. The first courthouse in Ottawa was constructed of red brick, completed in 1868 and used until 1912 when the present building with its marble floors and balustrades was erected.






